

THE CORPORATION OF THE DISTRICT OF BURNABY

BYLAW NO. 9464

A BYLAW to regulate the repair, service, maintenance and disposal of refrigerators, air conditioning units and cooling systems containing chlorofluorocarbons and halons.

The Council of The Corporation of the District of Burnaby ENACTS as follows:

1. This Bylaw may be cited as BURNABY CFC BYLAW 1990.
2. In this Bylaw, unless the context otherwise requires,
 - (a) "Chief Public Health Inspector" means the Chief Public Health Inspector of The Corporation of the District of Burnaby and includes any person or persons designated by the Medical Health Officer or the Chief Public Health Inspector to act on behalf of the Chief Public Health Inspector;
 - (b) "chlorofluorocarbon" means a member of the chlorofluorocarbon chemical family and includes any of the following substances:

Trichlorofluoromethane	(CC13F)	known as	CFC 11
Dichlorodifluoromethane	(CC12F2)	known as	CFC 12
Trichlorotrifluoroethane	(C2C13F3)	known as	CFC 113
Dichlorotetrafluoroethane	(C2F4C12)	known as	CFC 114
Chloropentafluoroethane	(C2F5C1)	known as	CFC 115;
 - (c) "equipment" means any refrigeration unit in a refrigerator, freezer, chiller or other cooling system or in an air conditioning unit including any motor vehicle air conditioner;
 - (d) "halon" means any one or more of the following substances:

difluorobromochloromethane (CF2BrCl) known as halon 1211
trifluorobromomethane (CF3Br) known as halon 1301
tetrafluorodibromoethane (C2F4Br2) known as halon 2402.

3. No person shall allow a chlorofluorocarbon or halon to be released into the atmosphere in the course of repairing, servicing, maintaining or disposing of any equipment that contains a chlorofluorocarbon or halon.

4. No person shall use a chlorofluorocarbon or halon for testing any equipment.

5. The owner, operator or occupier of every facility for the repair, servicing, maintenance or disposal of equipment shall allow the Chief Public Health Inspector access to any equipment, and any appliances and devices used or intended to be used for the repair, servicing, maintenance or disposal of equipment and shall provide such assistance and such operational records as the Chief Public Health Inspector may require so as to enable the Chief Public Health Inspector to conduct tests to determine whether there has been compliance with this Bylaw.



6. Every person who violates any of the provisions of this Bylaw is guilty of an offence and shall be liable to the penalties prescribed by the Offence Act.
